

Tips for Starting Research

- Always begin with yourself -- Gather a copy of your own birth certificate. marriage license, photos, etc.
- Continue back in time one generation at a time.
- Gather together everything you have -- papers, photos, documents and family heirlooms. Check with your relatives to see if they have any family documents you can photograph or scan.
- Clues to your family history might be found on the backs of old photographs, in the family Bible, or even on a postcard.
- Interview your relatives. Try to collect stories, not just names and dates, and be sure to ask open-ended questions. Interviews may make you nervous, but this may be the most important step in researching your family history.
- Write down everything you have learned from your family and begin to enter the information in a pedigree or family tree chart. This can be done on paper or on a computer.
- Explore the Internet for information and leads on your ancestors. Internet research is only a start. You will still want to go to libraries, archives, cemeteries, etc.. to document and further your research. Only use verified information.
- Remember to cite all your sources as you go along.
